Arrived at base camp early in the morning after driving out. It was really hot, so spent morning sorting stuff out and walked up in the evening. Failed to follow the 76 path several times and so took ages to get there. The stuff stored in the bus seemed fine - had obviously been frozen in for most of the year, but was free (mostly) of ice now. The camping spot had way less snow than last year, so loads of tent space. The 76a entrance was full of snow. (Like last year) + will need clearing, but 76 is straight lots, therefore hopefully not blocked lower down. Walked back much more quickly but it still got dark too soon (especially for Olly who was wearing prescription sunglasses).

148 was noted to be completely full of snow - if it wasn't for the paint, you wouldn't know there was a cave there...

19/7/06

Carrying + First Push of Expo!

Walked up the hill with another tediously heavy load. Arriving at the bivvy, Mark opted to do some surface work + the rest of us went to 196E.

While waiting at the base of 204E for Tom + Aaron, I had a ferret in the QMs in the chamber there.

QM 01 - 12C

is too tight; higher-level rift has sound of water but would require capping.

01 - 13C is also too tight, although it required an Aaron to tell this - I couldn't get round the first bend, but he did the 2nd and got to a point where no normal person could go on.

Also at the base of the pitch is a low passage not noted on the survey, on the left from the point you land. This goes by a short crawl to a right-hand bend. A short gallery leads to a climb down into a winding rift which goes on underneath Boulder Coaster; the limit of it is a boulder choke at high level, or a dodgy QM C climb down (probably needing ghostly bolting). Random Pitch Series in Great Oak

Plan was to go to Choc Salty Balls and bolt pitches there. En route we stopped at Great Oak Chamber. Mark descended to the bottom (on a very dodgy) + announced it didn't go so 00-32C is dead. Mark decided to take a look at 00-29D ~~which is not a dig~~

a rift going down a perfectly circular pitch, a short sequence of cascades + a second rather bigger pitch. At the bottom is an awkward S-bend leading to a tight pitch led. I bushed in a ~~1/4~~ bolt for half of a Y-hang while the others surveyed down.

Decided to drive up the night before + sleep in the car at the Bergrestaurant car park in order to get an earligh start befor it got too hot. Met some very friendly German cavers in the car park → their area is a 5-6hr walk away past Apelheas. Swiped emails addresses + websites.

Walked up to b121 and set lots of things up: water tap, other tarp, tent etc. Took photos of 97 and 148 cos they didn't have photos yet. Waited till it was less hot to walk back. Got distracted by a "new" cairn → marked by a cairn, but no evidence of exploration (the cairn may just be marking the path). This will be 2006-70 it is a crawling/staying horizontal entrance that drafts out. After ~10m there is a restricted pitch head that appears to open out into a ~5m pitch. Currently undescended, but seems to lead onto a snowy/rocky slope. Having been distracted by this cairn, we got back to the car too late to do another carry back up, so slept in the car again.

Carry up the final big in the morning. Took our time because our bags were heavy and Olly was suffering with a cold or hayfever. By the time we got to the b121

Olly wasn't feeling well + needed to patch his descent, so I went down 76 to rig the first 30m rope. Initially more snow than before - pretty ice round the walls in the entrance passage. Had to clear snow out the way to find the 2nd bolt + worried that things would become very tedious... Large snow slope to head of Draft Bitts (which is nice cos it holds the loose rocks in place), but below this considerably less snow. The top snow plug was only ~¼ the size of the second not at all. So the rigging spirals round the side somewhat unnecessarily this year! Come back out when rope ran out

Decided to split into two parties. Tom + I went to the pitch series off Great Oak^(AM 0024 D), now christened "Rivedance", while Mark + Aaron went to Cave Tree Chamber to bolt down the pitch there + see if it goes anywhere.

In Rivedance, one more bolt gave a Y-hang down a 9m pitch, then another Y-hang led to a 6m pitch. Here there is yet another pitch with 1¼ bolts in it at present.

After getting this far we opted to go back up to the ^{last} survey marker + survey back down, as I couldn't work out how to survey outward pitches upwards. Five legs got us to the pushing front, but when I got to a dry point + started to sketch I realised there were some rather weird

legs. Cursed loudly. While prosiking out we worked out between us that the first two compass readings had been read from the wrong scale + were effectively reversed. After checking Mark was still alive I went back down to make a proper sketch + Tom headed out. Got to surface to find it was raining slightly - yay! water to drink!

Mark started bolting & rigging the pitch out of Cave Tree Chamber (QM 00-39B) on 20/7/06, ~~Ally~~^(Mark p1) alone. We returned in force the next day, finding several pitches, a streamway and a particularly nice chamber. Yorkshire-style meander. ~~With a storm~~ Headed back after many hours leaving the next pitch for another time. Area dubbed Gösse Streamway for its smooth character & tipsy trajectory. Surveyed back to Cave Tree but failed to locate point in chamber so linked survey to point at end of passage into Cave Tree from Great Oak.

Sat 22nd July

76: Plugged Shaft / Strange ways

After a record length change we finally got underground, with Tom for Oly to rig on down Plugged Shaft, with me following with the drill in case we wanted to add anything. Got as far as the rock-bridge-sabotay, and Oly remembered the leads below this; firstly QM 04-09C (on the snow slope, which was incidentally lots snowier this year, and Oly spent a while kicking snow/rocks down). Anyway, QM 04-09C usually doesn't go, and QM 04-08C doesn't actually exist. Next, rather than setting across to the deviation and the ledge, Oly went down to the rock bridge below. We briefly visited here in 2004, and as it is easier to sit on the ridge or deviating hips, we hadn't yet returned. Oly descended the side pitch whilst I drilled a spot for a new deviation higher up. Ally's pitch led to QM 04-06C and QM 04-07C which turned out to connect at a short pitch down to a snow slope which I hopped + descended. "Upstream" at the bottom leads off a few metres to vertical fissures leading back to the canyon above. "Downstream" lead to a junction, right or left-ed back to the pitch, left quickly led out to pass out in a ^{most probably 2m04-1515} big pitch, which pretty much has to be Plugged Shaft! We must have been looking down at Yesterdays Tornies, which has way less snow this year. Didn't have survey kit, so came out (leaving it rigged for future survey trip) and went down the hill.


Failed Attempt on Biru

Stuff in Near End

Dave + Deep

Much stronger at the survey over the last year had left me convinced that the right place to look for the zonation from the 11th end to the Comrade was Kidney Bean.

So me and Deep met up ridiculously early (for us) + got the 9.25 bus up the hill, ring

going down 2016a + wandering how the Near End snow plug was lower than I've ever seen before, which would mean the subarctic snow plugs are actually higher than usual.

Kidney Bean turns out to be shite. The route to it involves an up and crawl over some boulders, a contour + says a body-sit + then a turn downwards leading into a muddy puddle.

So Deep + I decided we'd tick off the AMS in a slightly order of prioritising as Deep climbed down the scree slope in the sun [CO-71C] and announced it didn't go. I crawled up [CO-72S] until I was sure it connected to CO-77A. Finally we checked out CO-69A, which went - crawling for a

while squeeze under an arch (to a very br. dense chimney)

I shifted boulders until I could get my load in, at which point we about the size of two breeze blocks decided to roll over on my shoulder. Ouch.

Meanwhile Deep was looking around a bit + found a chimney which landed just the other side of the boulder pile, in a chamber with a waterfall. I was a bit confused, but Deep pointed out that there was a tube leading up with a really strong current. This emerged in a big trunk passage, and not far beyond I located a boot print. A large open column established that this was indeed the colonnade

Returned to Kidney Bean to fetch survey gear. Transpired that neither of us could actually read them, so we fucked off out instead.

After surveying a random sidepassage off Treeumphant as a surveying lesson under the tutelage of Dave (early up leads 16-22 in.) we moved onto looking at Sucker.

Pete was in a ferreting mood and the following was concluded: ferreting is not that much fun. Also 01-26C goes 6' SW straight ahead to a dig 01-28X and 01-27X are one and the same - 28X was climbed and goes at a higher level. 01-31C and 30C ~~are~~ are bloody tight, and unlikely to proceed far beyond visible range without stopping to undress. Pete also crawled down 01-51C and the way is semi-blocked by a small rock bridge (ie it is probably physically possible to get past ~~it~~ but you won't find me doing it!).

24, 25 & 26 July: Tunnocks Trips

Three days effort in the face of loose boulders and encrusted walls, requiring belay after belay after belay landed us at the bottom of this very impressive Tunnocks Schact. On the 25th, we reached "The Col," a spot between two large, steep boulder / snow slopes where one can recover in relative safety from falling rocks. Looking down the second slope, I could just barely make out a dark area in the distance where the monolithic roof slab meets the end of the second snow slope, pronouncing it either a continuation or a "dirty patch of snow."

On the 26th, we put in the final spit, descended to the end of the rope, walked down the remaining few meters and my "dirty patch of snow" resolved itself into a beautiful pool of ice with a 2-3m ice column and a horizontal passage. This became a mammoth trip, with Tom getting 10 pages of survey (~60m), the discovery of Three Fired Mice chamber, Bauernkroppen passage, and an as of yet unnamed phreatic tube. A good deal of photography was also accomplished. Speculation: tube probably connects to Hilda's beer cellar.

Our return though triumphant not mixed reception; Dave seemed slightly miffed by the propensity of our 2344 appearance to our 2400 callout.

Death and Glory 24/25th July '06

There were high hopes of a connection between the rear end and the ~~the~~ colonade. They were a mere 10m apart and there were several QM's that could go.

On Monday (24th) we got to the pushing front via 204a and checked out (00-70B and C grade leads both of which didn't go). We backed up a bit and tried out a 'A' lead. It went! Crawling flat out on mud and loose stones wasn't pleasant but we were making progress. Dave was the first there finding a dodgy looking boulder choke he slowly started to pull out rocks, it was almost wide ~~wide~~ enough but not quite, then, one of them, the size of a basketball fell on his shoulder. Things weren't going well but he seemed OK after about 15 mins.

(it was bigger than that - 1L)

I tried the small sift above the dodgy looking boulders, a few metres in there was a steep chimney into a chamber bypassing the hanging death. We were now in ^{the chamber about} the size of a small classroom. Dave was puzzled there wasn't meant to be water this high ~~up~~ here in 204. We ~~decided~~ that the previous survey was shit. We ~~hadn't~~ thought we were still in new territory, we named it ~~Water~~ unimaginatively, Waterfall Chamber.

We tested out all the leads that we could find but no connection. We had almost given up and were on our way out when I spied a small 7/8m crawl sloping upwards. ~~then headed~~

Dave went up first and I followed. Half way up I had heard screams of excitement we had found the azonade and the connection!!

We had to return through Death and Glory (Note: Death in the boulder ~~shut~~ choke/hanging death and glory is the chimney into waterfall chamber) to retrieve our survey instrument which we had left in Kidney Bean. But disaster struck once again, it was here, after we had ~~fixed~~ the connection we found out that neither of us could read the compass or clin.

Descended towards 214. This had a tag '2000-03' as expected so replaced it with a proper tag - took a photo. Care of a fairly wobbly bit of rock going ~20m straight down to a second slightly easier (probably too tight to be passable)

Then we went up south of 222, 223. Walked to where the GPS said 223 should be, but no evidence of a tag; same happened at 222 so we gave up & walked back home. Oddly enough the original survey claims remarkably that the survey points at these caves are tag ~~marked~~, so either I was being useless or my GPS was foiled by the steep hillside.

At 2nd pitch met Mark's team doing photos - I posed on the pitch came out rather well I think. We were informed that thunder was audible in Cave Tree, so rather than go out we went to Cloe Salty Ballo for a look at the dig 01-35D.

Sandee crawled in first + after removing some boulders we squeezed out into a little chamber. I climbed up into the ceiling where the draught whistles out of a boniferous chimney. I moved more rocks + got into a horrendously low chamber - floor = a critical angle boulder slope. Draught comes down from the top but I'm not going up there, it looks bloody lethal.

Went back out for survey gear + surveyed in, mind much ranting at the extreme crappiness of the pencil I was using. Couldn't find a good point to link to so the link is a bit of a bridge.

a few more hours to show them how to push new cave

We attached OM CO-21C, a tube on the left-hand wall of Treemupland. Charlotte climbed in + determined that it went, at which point I realised I'd forgotten the survey notebook.

Got back to the hole to find that P+J+C had found a parallel horizontal gallery linking together 0021, 00-22, and 00-17, which we'd duly surveyed. 00-19C doesn't go, and 00-16 and 00-18 join up to another parallel gallery on the other side. All now thoroughly ticked off + not going anywhere. Unfortunately we linked the survey to the wrong point (my fault - oops).

At this point I buggered off to drink coffee down the hill + tell the others to check out Sucker.

Wed 29th July 76: Strangways

Jamy + Olly

Drove up the night before again to sleep in the car at the Berg restaurant. Worked less well than last time cos there ~~were~~ was a group of people collecting bugs or moths or something using really bright lights. Olly needed to wait for the Bergstrand to open to go to the loo, so I set off to carry my bag to the bus, then returned to meet Olly at the car. Collected the 150m of rope we left there a week ago and went to the bus. Caught up on sleep for a few hours in the tent, then went caving. Took survey kit to survey Strangways. Started at the lower end and progressively

made our way back out. Due to the small & wiggly nature of the passage + the overhangs we got cold before we had surveyed it all, despite draught less than Plugged Shaft it was still distinctly cold. Came out to find the bivi had become moth-eaten, lots worse than last year.

Thu 27th July 06 Surface shift (near 76)

Jenny + Ollie

Planned to continue down 76, initially Ollie wasn't keen, but I can understand after I had infected him with sufficient Iceman-ness! Felt rather ill and was sick. Decided that whilst being sick on the surface wasn't much fun, it was a damn sight better than being ill underground. So we changed plans.

Headed towards 2004-08 to tag it, on route I realised we had everything required except the drill battery (we don't have a hard battery left). It returned to the bivi to retrieve it and returned to find an Ollie who had located an entrance that ~~now~~ seemed to fit the description of H7. Sadly after descending it, it didn't match the survey, so it is 2006-71. Ollie placed a bolt to descend on (and we used this for the tag). Apparently it draughted out, was quite tight, but did continue. Ollie ascended and we photoed, GPS-ed, tagged and Ollie surveyed.

Moved on to 2004-08, Ollie descended while I took photos, ~~it has~~ it is basically a large chamber with most of its roof missing. Ollie descended in the large-set entrance, used his trekking pole to walk around the snow plug, and climbed out on of the other two smaller entrances (both ~5m shafts). Despite being full of promise the

cave barely went further than you could see - Ollie surveyed and we bagged, photoed + GPS-ed. Moved on to tag and photo 2004-07 (which was surveyed in 2004) also surface surveyed 99 → 2004-01, to close a loop and improve loop closures in 99.

Thu Ollie:

Fri 28th July 06

76: Strangeways

Jenny + Ollie

Went to Strangeways with the aim of finishing the top half of the survey, de-signing and fitting down Plugged Shaft. Got to top of 1st pitch head in Strangeways and decided that moving some rocks might well improve it enough to make it the trade route for this year. Survey from where we ended before up through the top of Strangeways to the rubble slope below the plugged shaft rock bridge.

I went out to get the drill while Ollie moved loads of rocks out the way, both to make it safer and bigger. By careful aiming he was able to throw the rocks down the pitch in such a way as to smash off the worst protrusions on the way though. Once I had returned with a drill we put a bolt in the boulder near the pitch head, and with the aid of a step, a pulley, me pushing on the rope and Ollie racking the rock etc. managed to relocate it along with a few other rocks. Having made the pitch head considerably more passable, we proceeded to go down to yesterdays terminus in a suitable-for-lots-of-use (kind of) a way, rather than a pushing-only way. Got to yesterdays terminus and returned, on the way out I added a bolt for the little climb in Strangeways and discussed why that placing bolts in the ceiling is crap. Attempted to add a bolt near the rock bridge but the drill was flat after only 15¹/₄ holes so exited the cave.

76 Strangeways Plugged Shaft

Rigged to 76, and Oly rigged on down-plugged shaft. Discovered the rope was too short to reach the bottom, so had to use the rope intended for Boulder Chamber. Therefore Strangeways uses ~10m more rope than plugged shaft which is a shame. Rigged to Boulder Chamber, took some photos and surveyed out. Finally belay in the Strangeways survey at both ends which made me happy. The new route in seems drippy but no worse even after lots of rain which is good.

Sun 30th

Surface Shaft

Jenny + Oly

It finally stopped raining so we could dry all our gear on the slabs + do some useful surface jobs. I went over to 2006-71 to retrieve the Bentley path for the drill battery. Then we tagged 2005-99 (coated), and photodred 2005-9 (fluted). Packed stuff to go down the hill and walked on the old via-top camp path so that we could tag + survey 2004-03. I went in first and found that the cave doesn't stop where Oly thought it did in 2004. But we didn't have any caving gear, even if the driller provided enough light for the laser to suggest the passage was small, but not impassable, and I could get a ~10m reading through it. Tagged the entrance + surveyed what we could - need to return with gear.


Next went to photo 186 (on the col side of the Vord), shortly before 186, and slightly off the path we found a stooping horizontal entrance that draughted out. This is marked with a red painted "+" of unknown origin. GPS-ed + photodred the entrance and I surveyed what I could with out a light (discovered that the driller is enough to light the

compass enough to read it!). It seemed to continue some distance, though presumably is relatively trivial to have a "+", we will call this 2006-72 though it is not yet tagged as there was no drill battery left. Continued the shaft way to 186 and photodred the entrances. Then Oly suggested we might climb the Vord as we were "half way already". We were going to leave our bags at 186 and collect on the return, but then Oly took his scs as to be able to carry his camera + GPS. Followed a path for a short while, then lots of scrambling up rocks and tightly through boulders which was rather tedious. We got near what Oly thought was the summit, then Oly caught his foot on when a rock moved and hurt his toe. We decided it was worth carrying on to the summit in the hope of a better path down. Got to what we thought was the top but it wasn't at all. Lots of boulders continually on into the down... about half way to the top we hit a path + things improved. After surveying the book + taking pics we decided to follow the path down, me hoping it would lead to vaguely near 186 so I could retrieve my bag.

The path was very good, and went down the north side of the Vord, past 149, 156 and 201 which we photodred, then met the high-level Old Top Camp to 161 path, which was surprisingly easy to follow given its bouldered up in recent years. Got to the col + got my bag back. ~~Then~~ The 161 path and forked off to the Vord is many times better than going via 186. But Oly's foot hurt so I tried not to complain too much :)

After going down 204e we went to Treecampf ant passage first to finish the survey of the other day. we had to survey two legs in Treecamp. passage to complete the survey.

We went further south Treecamp. passage to check out the leads 01-53c and 01-54c.

01-53c went up to a small chamber with looks like 2 passages. It was tight and muddy. John crawled in first, didn't fit through the right passage going north-ish. Chantalle crawled into the left passage. Had to take her helmet off because it was ~~too~~ tight. Could see around a corner the passage continued north-ish with a little chamber with a pile of mud. Didn't look like the ceiling was going up somewhere, so we got out. couldn't be bothered to survey it. It was too tight anyway I think it was about 5 meters.

01-54c went down. Chantalle crawled down and went for a meter or 4 before the already tight crawl went even tighter because of a bridge of stone in the middle of the passage. The passage went on beyond there but nothing significant. Didn't survey this bit either. Didn't look like it was going somewhere.

After checking out these leads we went over to Riverdance to derig the pitches.

This all went well. On the way back up we discovered why it is called Riverdance. There was a lot more water and a pretty waterfall in the 2nd pitch. It was very tiring for John. There were lots of pitches!

At this point it was already midnight and we decided to go back up.

We also checked the wall at the 2nd belay for loose boulders. John kicked down some boulders. It all looks alright now.

A belay at that ledge gained a bouldery platform at the top of the main shaft. Placed a horrendously awkward spil ahead of me on the right wall, which sort of goes a hang down the shaft.

The shaft proper is roughly round, clearly phreatic, and slightly sloping, about 8-10m across at a guess. Descended and I ran out of rope + turned around + came back up. About 10m below the last belay there is a window into what looks like a small chamber with a rift in the floor - maybe this might be a slightly less intimidating alternative ring?

On the way out we did some ferreling. The following information is recorded in the survey notes but I may as well put it here as well.

We will attempt to tag + surface survey next time we go past. Looked for 86 ~SE of 82 + shaft. Only really found 1 possible shaft, but sadly no trace of paint whatsoever.

3rd Aug 06 Roping in 76

Went down 76, hoping to dig to bottom of spent ledge and leave (less) tackle for the next trip. Underground was pretty wet - I was very glad for the modern SRT rig as opposed to ladders... Still got quite damp though,

especially going into Stomways and lower parts of Plugged Shaft. Looks like it won't be impossible at least. Taged a short bedding in Stomways, then re-rigged the Plugged Shaft stuff to avoid knott passes and to use the rope in the most efficient way.

Lots of water going down Key Series (this is where the Plugged Shaft water goes). Only rigged on Through Boulder Chamber + Follow Through -
Shaft while I was there, my least favorite bit of cave! There was
to bring the 3 bags through. Lots of water noise EVERYWHERE! Got to the

We were pretty keen, but didn't want to drown, so decided we might as well do surface stuff. Wandered around in the general direction of 99-06-02 and investigated some holes. The only one of any significance at all (10 m or more diameter) will be 2006-73. This has two entrances, though the connection is mostly closed. The main entrance is down a very large snow plug into a chamber, on the top of which the other (small) entrance sits. There's a cool big ice curtain at the bottom, but also a rock wall not miles off from a tunnel passage. However, there was a draughty tape descended on the left to indicate with a rope in the future.

It didn't look very promising, so I crawled down to look and basically it is a short, wet, cold unpleasant cave that doesn't go. So I swabbed it and it is now "kicked off" cos we surface swiped from it to 2005-a something

Surface surveying in the rain sucks, I got colder than I have been on this
expedition, and we had to retreat at half time to warm up with hot

Woke up to yet more rain, and our trip to Base Camp as the weather forecast got the response "lots of mist, followed by more mist", so we figured that the 1970's route was unlikely to be doable for a while. Going down the hill seemed the best plan, with some surface surveying + tagging on the way. Firstly tagged 108, then 2005-98 and 2005-97, and tied them into the 2005-a1 surface survey. Continued surface survey to 2006-71 and then 2005-08 and 2005-07 then 175 and 176. It was loads better than yesterday cos it was less foggy and the survey legs could on occasion be longer than 20m. Headed north from 176 to look for 98, failed, but in hindsight, the bearings suggest it is a reasonable distance further north than we looked.

Continued the survey to 174 and then 200. Planned to retag 200, but that had already been done (Antraly as it needed a non-Bmm spanner). Because of the

worsening weather, and the time we waited looking for it was kind of getting dark. We had both thought that the clearly cairned path from 174 to 175 and so on continued the other way from 200+ near the col. If it does, we failed to follow it, and ended up to far west in an area of Bands, followed by more bands, and it was raining and getting dark and Ollie had a bad headache.

~~Colin~~ decided not to go and by 10pm and aimed ~south, every so often the mist cleared enough for us to see the col and the scree below the Boarding Wall which helped a bit, though the bands made it hard to pick a direction to walk in. Mostly followed a faint line (gully) and eventually hit the old Top Camp to Puffball path which was (a) well cairned and (b) remembered by Ollie. Got to old Top Camp as it got dark was was raining.

From then on it was dark, rainy + foggy and we only had one light, and Ollie's headlight too much to wear it (cos it was attached to his helmet). Thus it took us an hour and half to get back to the car, and was one of the more epic car → col walks I have done yet.

Struggled to find the way out of the car park as the visibility was so poor! Fortunately after ~the 3rd lappon we dropped off the fog and could drive at more than 5mph!

Satisfied bus camp by arriving at 11:30pm when it had been dark raining for hours.

Failed to find point on any that might have gone, then ~~they~~ ~~had~~ ~~holes~~ we reached the base so set off ~~to~~ to the bio to get there just before dark.

Also, on the way up we stopped on the fall road where the open cutting area on the left by a small shed (presumably a building associated with a ski lift that no longer exists). Walked along a little path to a stream which we followed to its spring (near a sheep's hut). Apparently this is cave member though no painter tag visible. Only duly photost + GPSed it.

10th Aug 2006

76: Waste of Time

Couldn't decide whether to look at Razor Advance, the Time+Space pitch or the 1970's Route. Picked Time+Space as it was measured. Oly bolted down as I fed out the 150m rope from the big bag. Surprisingly it only needed 2 bolts (as well as the pitch head of shares with the pendule/house rope). The 150m rope was very fast - even with a bouldery ab I didn't need to hold the handle in on my stop at all. Sadly after 31m the pitch got quite droopy and ended - a light slot dropped away in the floor but was dry. It may be possible but from its position looks like it will hardly appear in a topo / in log series. So that lead was baled off in a dry dock area. Surveying + dry-dragging got us back to the Tap Room where we stopped to rig down spent ledge stuff. I got my cd (partly cos I had spent the time Oly bolted Waste of Time sitting there) and cos spent ledge is really ~~dry~~ draughty. Also, but brain thought it was bed time & it was nearly midnight. I got my cd + useless and made Oly turn round.

Eventually ~~probably~~ warmed me up & I felt better, but I have never been that cold before and it was crap.

Weather wasn't great, and Oly woke up with a bad headache, so decided to do surface sulf again. Went over to Ice curtain ~~area~~ Cave (2006-73) and I went down to the lead. This is a snow narrow pitch on the left bank the ice curtain. I kicked about of snow all the way and it was wide enough to abseil down. Got in down and the wagon was held by ice flow (may be passable adslfered for) which appears from beyond. To get to where the ice comes from requires climbing up a 45° boulderslope for few meters - I wasn't brave enough to step up onto it in case it all moved. A bolt may make this possible. Horizontal stuff appears to continue and then goes round a corner.

Sulf surveyed out + GPS-ed entrance

Moved onto 2006-03, I went through the squeeze which was larger than it looked + got into steeping height passage. Followed this for a few meters till I saw bones. This freaked me out for a bit, but after some reassurance from Oly I continued. Passage continues ~ 2m further than the dots leg from the last visit and then ends suddenly at a small chamber with solid rock walls. I carefully photod the bones on Oly's camera, we think it is probably from a Lemur but don't know.

Surface surveyed this to 210 which appears NOT to have been retagged, but we didn't have fraying stuff.

Returned to bivi, fraying linking in 2005-94 and 2005-96 to the surface survey.

Got underground late (3:40pm!) due to moving the led back out of the bivi cave cos it is weathered, and much effort at lighting Oly's new backup stove.

Dove to Spel Leda where Oly rigged down to 100' gear end. Rigged the rest of the pitch on a wide Y-hang to a 1970's spit (in hindsight a new bolt further along will be significantly better). The water drops down lower in the off, but the way on is up a meter to a traverse along ledge to a wedged in boulder which rocks back and forth if you stand on it...

Dropped down another meter on a 1970's spit to a ledge. Oly put in a back up bolt and moved over the pitch. Used the 1970's hang bolt as a deviation to get to a ledge after notes down (this isn't in the best place). Had a nice Y-hang here, and Oly abseiled down frags.

Pitch wasn't as free hanging as we expected - it got a deviation on

a natural, and needs rigging better as currently you need to fend off with your feet near the bottom. Then a rebelay for a few meters down to the Balcony. The crevicing pennant was still there, though a bit damaged with age. Only put in about and were abled to the floor. In the hole we were a bit overwhelmed by all the big boulders - some on the floor, some wedge above as rock bridges. The wagon is up the boulder pile, under a few rock bridges and back down the other side (Archery Boulders Pit) which now has 2 bolts, and the going starts higher. Followed the passage down our and and boulders and heard water levels rise significantly (apparently a waterfall on the surface). Decided it was probably an early storm and so water levels would hopefully drop after a while. Figured the pitches might well be quite wet, so decided to survey first at this level so the water could good decrease, and postpone surveying the pitch. Continued down the passage to a four-way junction. Left appears to be the 1979 route → the stream cuts down and disappears, but you can traverse on ledges above to reach a 7m pitch (which takes me, but we didn't descend). Straight on must be the 1978 route and is initially dry muddy passage to a junction at a pitch (which again we didn't drop). Right is an inlet from above Survey all this, which took a while, back up the hang bolt from the balcony. Water levels still highish, but nowhere near as bad as I expected, and the worst bit was the Tap Room. Only hardly carried the drill up the bottom half + we then top half of the cave. Wished we had more water bottles with us - had left one in Stomper's bag and one in Boulder chamber, could have done with water bottle down. Just made it out with 30 mins to spare before our 8am callout!

Managed to get from the pitch Y-hang at the base of Notch to the very bottom in 2 legs which was nice → The diff helped a lot, though sadly there was too much water drops for it to get a plausible height for the air (thought must be lots...). Came on to the PFT (1970 route) and dropped it (ripping from a natural hold spot cos we didn't have the drill) at the bottom, the stream went the "wrong" way i.e. not what we expected, and must be a new inlet not the one the drops down before this pitch. Had a little look upstream and it is soon a waterfall but looks straight forward to climb up.

went downstream (1970 route) though tedious sideways muddy soft which would (I

imagine) be crap with taddle. Not to Gents Pitch which we could again do with a natural back up and a pitch lead (1970's spit but also needed a natural deviation → this was lead with an inlet which is presently the stream that got left higher up.. followed the big drift downstream, on a run con in on the right (presumably the 1978 route), continued bouldering, now on ledges above the stream, continued till we realised we had lost far away, and the drift was winding. Surged back, which was both than feared as the legs were a reasonable length. Back at the top of the PFT only traversed on over the pitch on ledges (above the inlet), and it continues - a lead for next year.

In all this stuff (and the 1970 route) the draught was intense. The cave not cool as it is in the base of Notch a wood which is kind of drafty + needs more insulation next year. Incidentally it was a very hot day and the draught was normal in the higher stuff on the way in and out, so seems unlikely to be a reversed draught day as they only seem to happen when very cold outside.

~~17th~~ Went out the cave doorway and carrying gear up to below Boulder chamber when we got tired and went back the cave. Got out before it got light!

At the end of John + Deep's new stuff was a short slope to a smallish round pitch. I bushed in a bolt (while supported by a ludicrously small nut) + descended 9m to a sloping rock floor. Shattered A short shallow chamber down ad to a chamber with two ways on.

Left is a stooping-height passage which slopes down to a huge pitch (2.9 sec drop but also v. wide + long). Shortly before it the pitch lead is a cut on the left with bat dipping, leading to another window onto the same pitch.

Back in the chamber, straight on leads past a bolt pin in the floor to a section of passage with a sloping floor. There is a climbable hole in the floor (QMB) and beyond this the passage emerges part-way down a large sloping rope pitch (?A to descend, ?B to climb up.)

At this point we were out of rope + couldn't continue further down, so having to leave, + Sandeep had a bolt

bolt, so we turned round. Splicing the tight take from Sauerkraut to the new pitch was a pain in the ass. Digging was very tiring; the hole to the top is. The stonework is becoming ever + really dodgy here, and the 6m of lower 10cm rope is enough to fill a gap, so I had to smash the last cut at the second up + set + ... the pointed bolt actually it didn't jam.

Decided to find it was indeed dry; just about managed to follow the course. We must + make up some more sections next year.
